
I'm very glad to say that Isobel will be supporting me in that, so do keep in touch.

Pause before Christmas

Having had a very enjoyable and moving Advent, including the heartwarming farewell from Amos Trust, it's time to pause before Christmas.



I believe in the way of peace I believe in the way of Jesus And in the values God has shown us Born anew in the child of Christmas Oh I believe in the child of Christmas

This is a strange and difficult year in many ways for families but I've been encouraged by some words from Palestinian friends - even some words from forgotten Gaza. I think they help us to draw on the strength of the encouraging message of Christmas - that despite no room in the inn, despite occupation, the words of Christmas hope break through, reminding us that a peacemaker was born - and that brings faith and hope; and the words of our friends remind us to pray for a turning point for peace and justice.

I'm very conscious that the people of Bethlehem are finding this one of the most difficult times for so many years because they have no pilgrims. So I am including a

prayer at the end of the newsletter that reminds us not to be silent about Bethlehem, Gaza and the community of the Holy Land.

Of course at the point I wrote this song I had never dreamt of the impact of a pandemic, so as we pray for the end of occupation let's also pray about the impact of Covid in the Holy Land as well as in our own communities.

Christmas words from Bishop Riah in Nazareth

In response to the lyrics in the image above, Bishop Riah Abu El-Assal, a longtime friend and the Bishop who made me a Canon of St George's Anglican Cathedral - sent the following thoughts which I share with you all -

"I too believe in what you believe, and a little more:

I believe that peace is the way

I believe that Jesus is the way

And I believe in the Child of Christmas,

Who was born not only in Bethlehem,

But also in you, your family, and in me and my family

Therefore we are entitled to celebrate with joy

HAVE A MOST BLESSED AND GLORIOUS ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS.

And I pray that 2021 will be the year of the turning point for good, for justice, for peace, for reconciliation and for life with dignity for all created in God's image, among them the Palestinians."

Prayer - Here God is at Home

A prayer I wrote for the Sabeel-Kairos Advent Service held on Zoom last Saturday afternoon

O God, Advent reminds us we should be like candles shining for justice We should be the community that refuses to be silent about the Palestinians of Bethlehem

Of Gaza, of the West Bank, of Israel, and refugee camps across the Middle East

Because the story of Bethlehem at Christmastime reveals something special It reveals that you are the God with such a precious love for humanity

So we must cherish human rights

You are the God of humility made visible in the ordinary person

In the everyday ordinariness of life

You are the God of the forgotten and the insignificant

And therefore there is hope for all as we too are shown how to live

And you are the God of Bethlehem today

You would chose it again

Precisely because the world thinks it is insignificant

And its people of no value

So the angels would sing again

To say "Here God is at home"

And the wise would be surprised again

Saying "Here God is at home"

And shepherds and carpenters making olive wood gifts

And tour guides and drivers of coaches for pilgrims

In a year when there are no pilgrims

And innkeepers and all the community

Women, children and men

Crushed, humiliated, invaded and imprisoned

Under occupation and under lockdown

Can stand up tall with confidence and proclaim

"Here God is at home"

Because you've shown your character in Bethlehem

You have affirmed humanity in Bethlehem

And still do today

And that is the message of Christmas

Bethlehem is not forgotten

Palestine is not forgotten

Here God is at home

As we take our stand of solidarity with the Palestinian community

May we never be silent

May our churches never be silent

Then we will find God is at home

Justice is at home

And peace is at home

We have found the true message of Christmas

We pray that peace may flow into our fragile world
bringing healing and hope.
