#### **Love Must Not Be Silent**

Some very powerful words from Susan Rantisi Bahroum, a wise and thoughtful friend from Nazareth



"Words fail to express the utter sadness and horror at the enormous amount of hate shown in Jerusalem during the 'March of the Flags' on Tuesday. Sentences like, "Death to the Arabs," "A good Arab is a dead Arab," "The second Nakba is coming," and more are provocative and spiteful. Many were shouted out by children and everyone was under the protection of the Israeli police and the participation of some Israeli government ministers. I had thought about sharing the video, but I don't want to give them a voice. Hate like that should be silenced. I shudder to think about what these children will do when they grow up. Also, what kind of government

anywhere in the world would allow such a display of hate?! However, when you think about it, the people who belong to the land do not need a display of power to show it, while the occupier does. We do not need a parade to show we care and this is our homeland. Young people who started to clean up the area had their brooms confiscated! All we can do is remain steadfast, and ask you my friends for your solidarity and your voices. May Justice prevail!"

#### Strong Words of a Grandmother in Jerusalem

Another powerful piece from Samia Khouri, educator and Co-Founder of Sabeel, living in East Jerusalem - just before the result of the recent election

"Yesterday my youngest grandson, who turned 15 at the beginning of this month, was walking in our neighbourhood, towards the barber shop to have a hair cut, when he was stopped by ten soldiers who beat him up before letting him go. Why? Can anybody who has any common sense answer me. There were no demonstrations, and the people in our neighborhood were going about their own business. The soldiers were in their full gear and were not in any danger. Yet the US continues to buy the gimmick of PM Netanyahu that Israel has the right to defend itself, and it cannot tolerate that his people are being attacked. Does he think we can tolerate our children being hurt, and brutalized by a sick army who shows up out of the blue in our residential areas. Seeing whole families and children killed by the raids on Gaza, we are grateful for the safety of our children. Maybe the PM should hear some of the voices of his own soldiers from "Breaking the Silence movement," and should read some of the Israeli press who are accusing him of flaring up the region so he can stay in office and avoid going to jail for his corruption charges. Not at all surprising; nothing is beyond him."

#### **Christian on a Crane**

Modern-day Stylite climbs 200m crane in solidarity with the Palestinians

69 year old activist Nick Georges stayed on top of a crane overnight to raise awareness of the plight of Palestinians. "For three months I was sent to Palestine as a humanitarian witness. I witnessed the atrocities and the horrors of the illegal Israeli occupation of the Palestinian homeland.

I've seen a house where a family of four were burned alive by Jewish settlers with incendiary bombs. I've seen land desecrated, olive tree plantations burned. the Palestinians have no rights, even their electricity and their water is taken from them. As a Christian who cares I cannot just stand by and let this go on... we should all be doing more to promote the cause of peace and freedom for the Palestinians."

Although I don't necessarily advocate climbing up cranes, one can understand his frustration - he has seen what's going on and then he is being ignored. Georges posted a separate video from the top of the crane on Tuesday in which he said that he tried to engage with his member of Parliament on the issue of Palestine but that it was "a complete waste of time."

Just for the record, I will not be going up a crane - I can hardly get up my own step ladder! - however, though this may not be our favourite option, we all have to find a way to raise our voices for the Palestinian people. I particularly think it's helpful to pass on some words from the Palestinian Christian community called Kairos Palestine where they issue what they call "A Cry of Hope" to all the churches and Christians in the world, asking them to stand against injustice and apartheid, urging

them to work for justice... "We declare that the military occupation of Palestinian land constitutes a sin against God and humanity. Any theology that justifies the occupation and justifies crimes perpetrated against the Palestinian people lies far from Christian teaching."

#### **Call from Western Sahara**

for those who are being brutalised,
ignored or forgotten.
May we be those who speak up for refugees,
May we be those who speak up for the oppressed in Palestine
May we bring support where we can and may we never be silent.

Love is never silent and justice is never silent –

May we find ways to speak up

Especially when our sisters and brothers are asking for our solidarity – with our voices telling the story.

May we echo the Palestinian Christian "Cry for hope"

And stand against injustice and apartheid 
And stand against the ethnic cleansing of Palestinians.

May we show the love and justice of Jesus

And may the God who dances in creation Who embraces us with human love Who shakes our lives like thunder Bless us and drive us out with power To fill the world with her justice.


And find ways for our voices to tell the story.

The final paragraph is a blessing from St Hilda's Community


